There were 246 citizens that died because of the snow storm in Texas (Svitek).

Natural disasters do not avoid certain nations and have happened spontaneously, such as with the wildfires in Australia, the 2022 China Earthquake, and the Floods in Pakistan. The predictability of natural disasters is something that is also becoming less accurate so many nations do not have adequate time to prepare.



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
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
NATURAL DISASTERS AND ECONOMICS

Natural Disasters

There are various natural disasters across the globe. Delegates will each have to have come prepared with a strong understanding of the natural disasters that impact their assigned country. This is important as the solutions they propose throughout the conference should not only focus on the most common forms of natural disasters but should also work on addressing the natural disasters that most frequently impact their nations. Natural disasters can range anywhere from cyclones to droughts and even wildfires. The risk reduction is the most important part in order to make sure that as many lives as possible are saved and that people can return to their normal lives pre-natural disaster as soon as possible.

When thinking of risk reduction events, it is important to try and establish measures that will be appropriate for nations that are high at risk and vulnerable to natural disasters. Due to the location of tectonic plates across the world as well as the Mariana trenches, there are locations that are more vulnerable to certain events than other locations in different places. 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

Economics

Because of the variation of natural disasters that can target different nations, the costs with each natural disaster are different. The following map represents the differences in inequalities for natural risks between the more wealthy versus the non-wealthy nations:
